Musial's Five Homers in Doubleheader a New Major League Mark

Average Now .400, 21 RBIs

About 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon a New York newspaper man, gathering material for a magazine story, asked Manager Eddie Stanky a question, on the steps of the Cardinals' dugout at Busch Stadium.

It was phrased carefully by Archibald Gordon (Tiger) Murray, the eminent Princeton alumnus and sporting writer. "Who," he inquired, "is the best player in baseball? Stan Musial?"

Stanky's reply wasted as little time as one of Stan the Eighty-Grand Man's hardest-hit drives reaching the streetcar tracks.

"You," said manager to writer, "have just asked and answered your own question."

The Tiger nodded and explained that all other managers had agreed, and certainly a crowd of 26,662 that sat through a seven-hour doubleheader yesterday wouldn't voice disapproval.

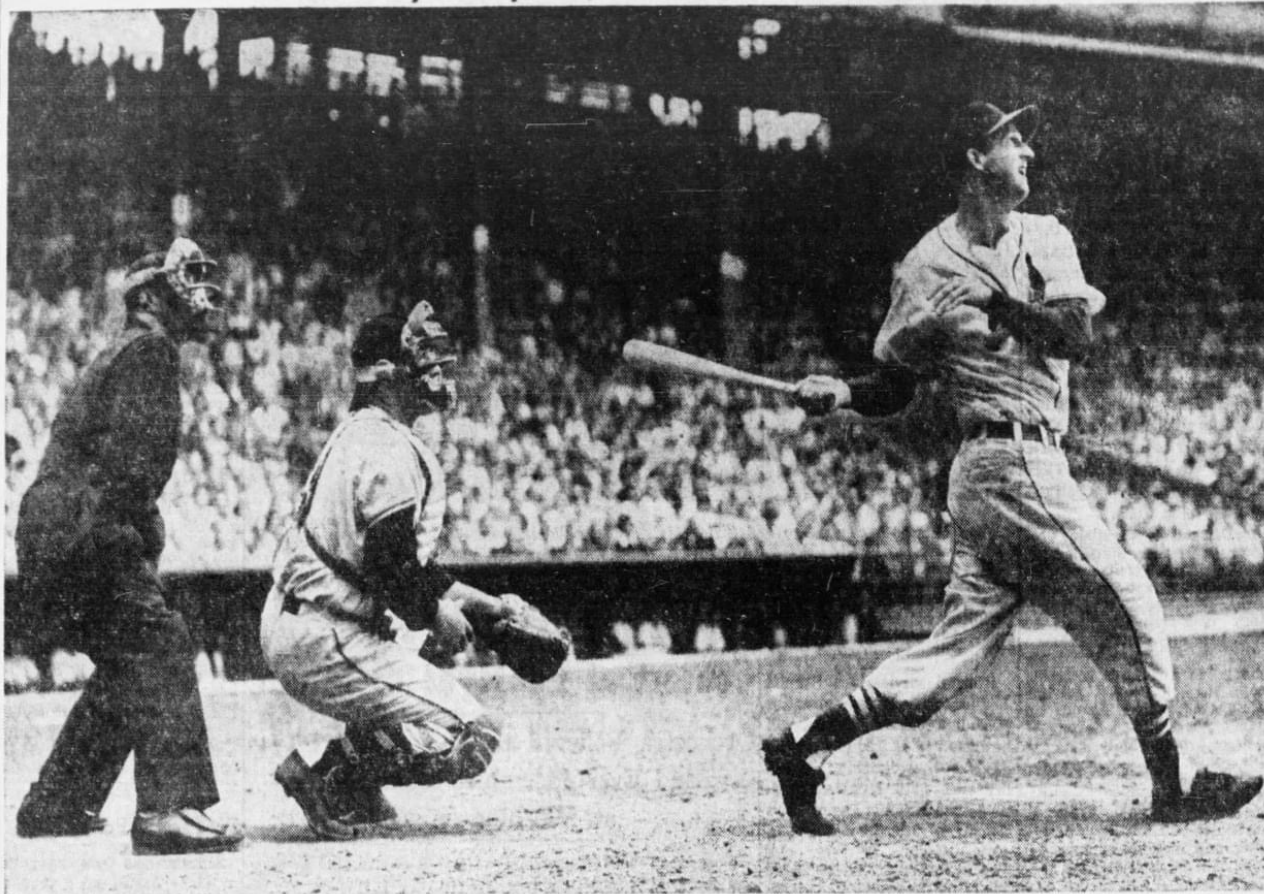
Cheered for Pop Fly.

In fact at about 7:55 p.m. there was an amazing phenomenon of baseball as, just before climbing over one another to get away for warmed-over dinners, spectators applauded Musial for—all of all things—hitting a high pop fly to first base.

They had stayed, you see, not because they had great hopes of the Cardinals sweeping a doubleheader instead of settling for a split, but because they were fascinated to see if Stan could do it once more.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 3 (AP)—Kentucky Derby winner Determine will not run in the Preakness at Pimlico on May 22, it was announced today by the thoroughbred's trainer, Willie Molter.

Molter, who said he was speaking for owner Andy Crevolin, said, "We don't want to push our luck too far."

The trainer said Determine would be returned to California by plane, leaving here Wednesday. He said the Derby winner would be given a couple of weeks' rest before running at Hollywood.

Ray York, who rode Determine to victory in the Derby, left by auto with his wife today for California.

Crevolin could not be reached immediately for comment.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 3 (AP)—Shelley Mayfield, a transplant Texan playing professional golf out of Chicopee, Mass., long will remember the 1954 San Francisco open invitational tournament.

We had a Kit Carson right here in Jefferson City
He was the son of Charles Carson, brother of Forest Carson, of Carson and Coil, attorneys.

Carson was born in 1809 in Richmond, no not Virginia, but Kentucky
Christopher Carson was born in Richmond, Kentucky Dec 24, 1809
Moved to Missouri when he was 1, lived in Boonslick area
Became good friends with the Daniel Boone family
Kit's older brother William married Millie Boone niece of Daniel
Their daughter Adaline became Kit's favorite playmate

His father Lindsay died when Kit was 8
As a teenager he was apprenticed to a saddlemaker
Ran away with fur trappers headed for Santa Fe, NM
Kit Carson's horseback duel 1835, with Frenchman Chouinard

Became a "mountain man" associated with Old Bill Williams and Jim Bridger
Served as a guide for John C Fremont on his expeditions west
1842, 1843 and 1845
In 1846-48, participated in the "Bear Flag Revolt", an attempt to claim California for the US

Tried to become a rancher and trapper.
Served as Indian agent for several years
Married 3 times, two Indian wives and a Mexican lady named Josefa, they had 8 children



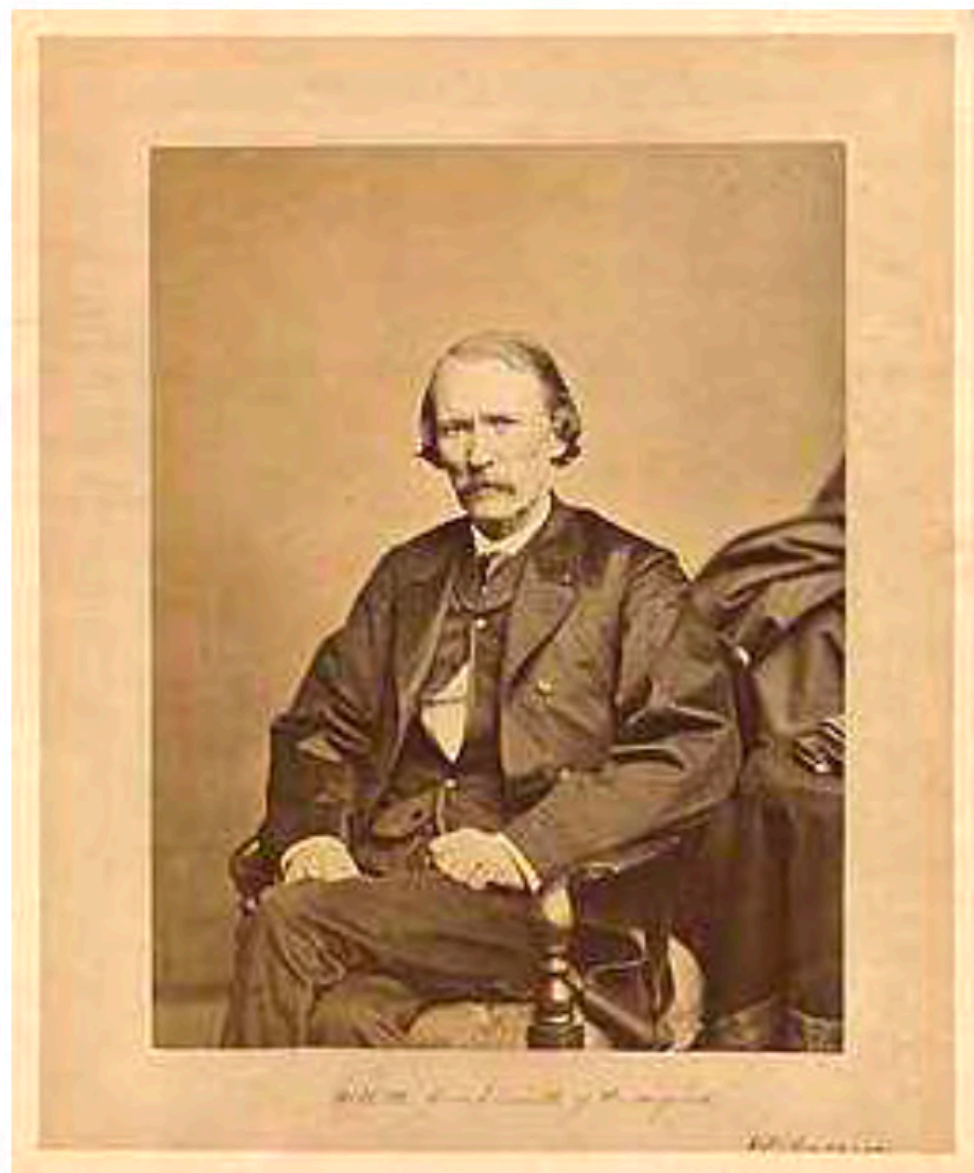
In the next few years, he became the subject of the so-called "Dime Novels" which Portrayed him as a bigger-than-life hero

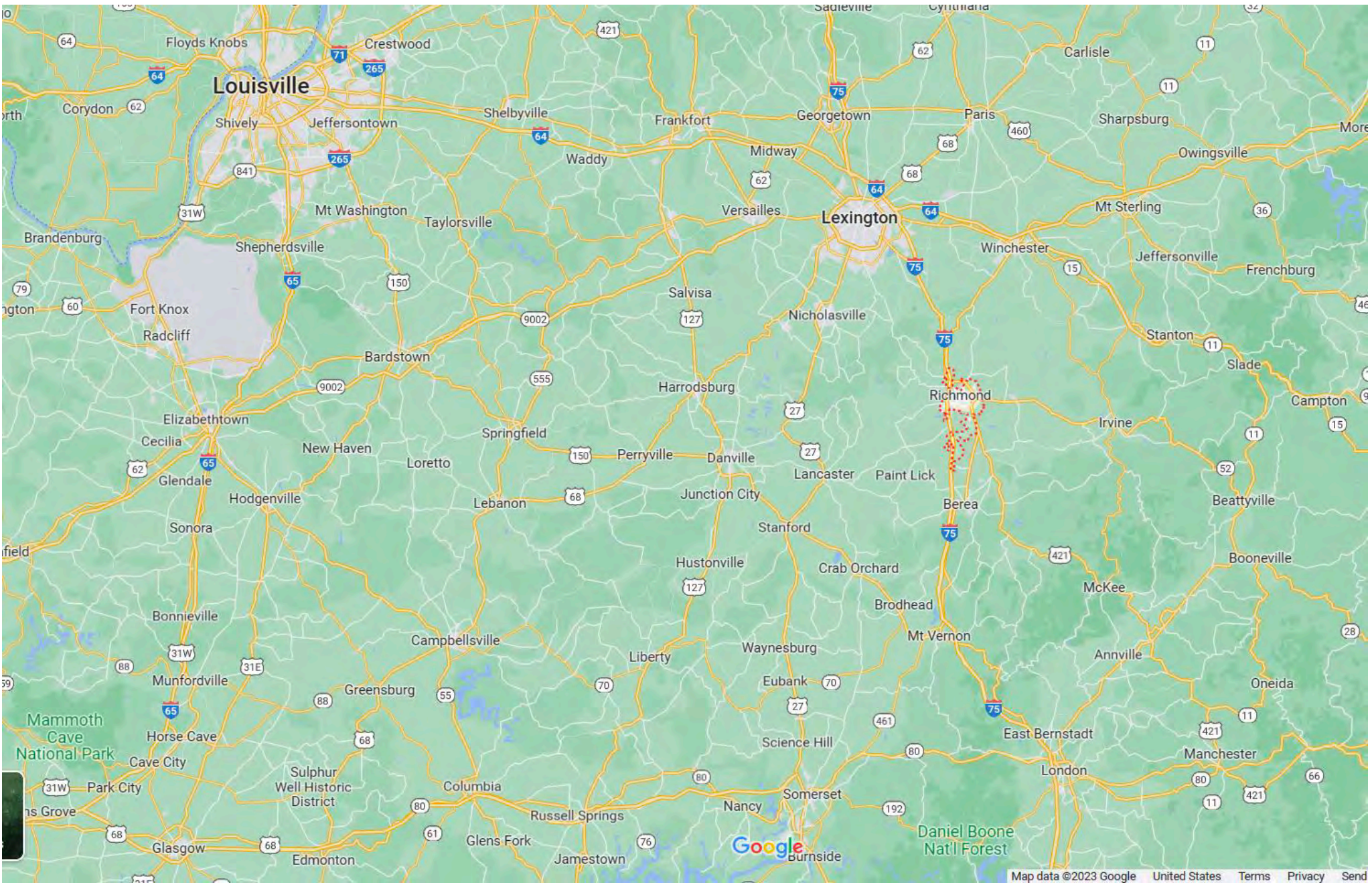
When Civil War broke out Kit volunteered to serve the Union cause
Was commissioned a Lieutenant Colonel, in charge of a regiment
Fought in the famous battle of Glorieta Pass, Rebels driven from NM.
Left the Army as a Brigadier General

Spent his last days in Taos, NM with his wife Josefa, making babies.
When their eighth child was born, Josefa died in childbirth.
Kit died one month later at age 58, in 1868
His last words were "Goodbye old friends, Adios compadres"

Adolphus Busch was born in Germany, state of Hesse, in 1839, the 21st of 22 children. Busch came to New York in 1861 when he was 18 with his three older brothers. Eberhard Anheuser had helped found a brewing company in 1853 called the Bavarian Brewing Company. It struggled, later named Anheuser Brewing Co.

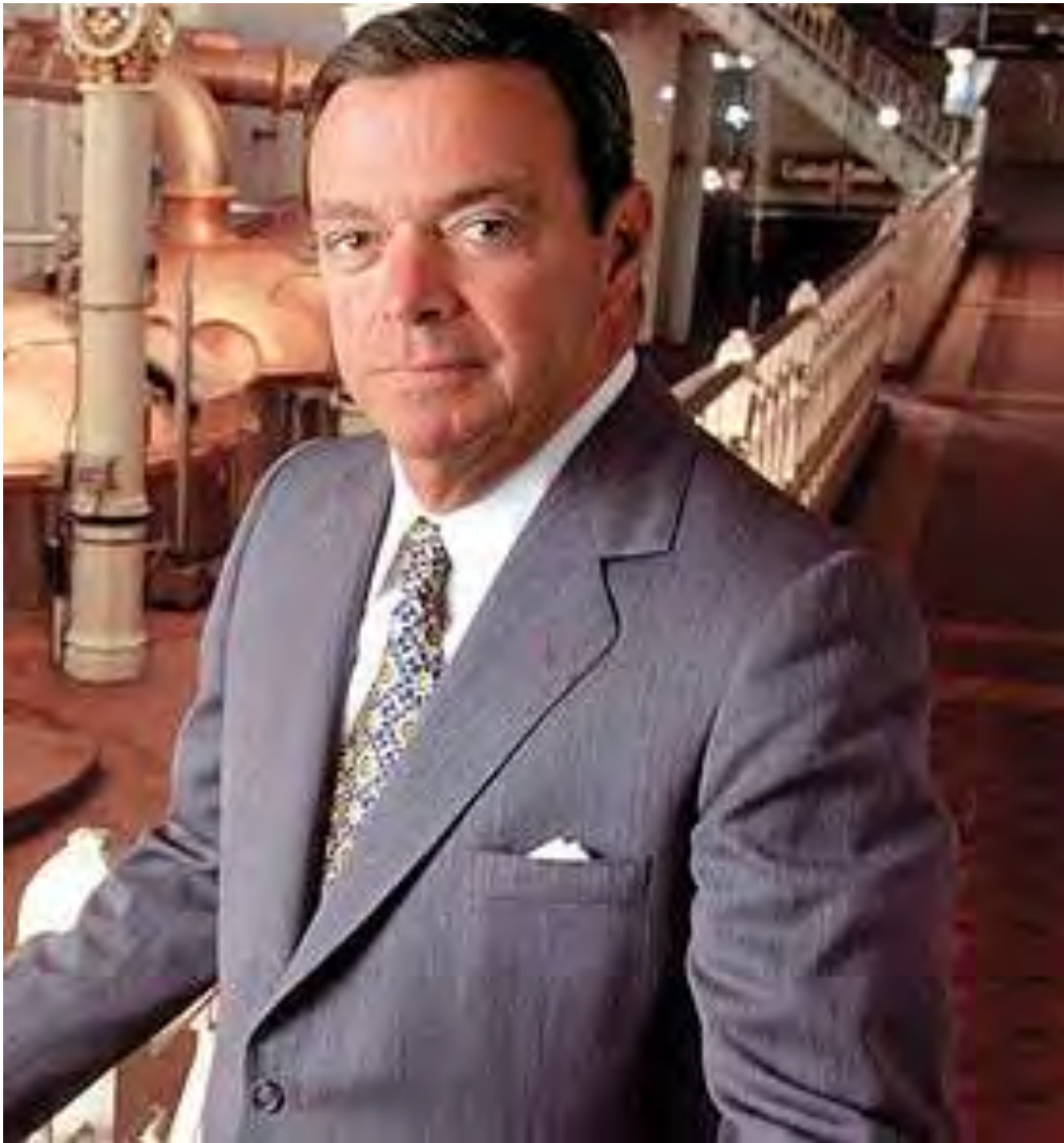
Adolphus went to work for Mr. Anheuser, got sweet on his daughter, Lily, and married her. Before long he was co-owner of the brewing company and renamed it Anheuser-Busch.

GRANDMA MOSES is an inspiration for all who feel life is over at any definite age. She was seventy-six before she swung her first paint brush. Now Grandma Moses' designs are collectors' items, and her original paintings hang in major art exhibits. Her Christmas scenes, painted exclusively for Hallmark Cards, have become favorites. This year Grandma Moses' tile paintings, like number 5 on the preceding page, will be seen on many "art-galleries-on-the-mantel."



SAUL STEINBERG's work has been widely exhibited in museums in both America and Europe and his droll line drawings are familiar to everyone. Born in Rumania, Mr. Steinberg earned a degree in architecture from the University of Milan before coming to America in 1941. He served in the U. S. Navy in World War II and is now an American citizen. You'll recognize number 4 as one of Saul Steinberg's distinctive designs for Hallmark Christmas Cards.



DORIS LEE first won recognition in 1935 when she was awarded the coveted Logan Gold Medal for her now famous painting, "Thanksgiving Dinner." In 1944 she was commissioned by *Life* to paint scenes from the musical comedy hit, "Oklahoma." Miss Lee recently won a Federal competition to create a mural for the Post Office Building in Washington, D. C. One of her Christmas designs, painted exclusively for Hallmark Cards, is No. 6 on the preceding page.



NORMAN ROCKWELL is undoubtedly America's favorite illustrator. Fame came early, for his first magazine cover won immediate recognition. And ever since, to millions of Americans, Norman Rockwell has been the kindly artist who holds a mirror to human nature by means of a paint brush. He catches all the excitement of the arrival of the Christmas tree in the Christmas Card reproduced on the preceding page as No. 3. His painting, "Four Freedoms" is world famous.



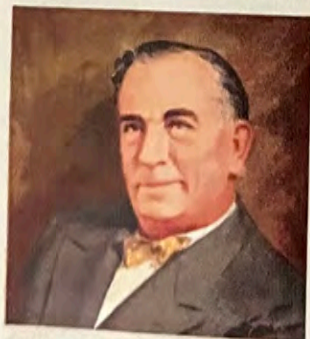
HULDAH, as she is known in art circles, is Mrs. E. F. Jaffe of New York City. Working mostly in oils, she is an accomplished painter of landscapes, still lifes and portraits. But she is perhaps best known for her paintings of graceful ballerinas, children, and beautiful girls set in a romantic background, like the young carolers in the snow, No. 1 on the preceding page. Although her famous "Huldah girl" is dark-haired, Huldah herself is a blonde, sun-tanned beauty from Texas.



SIR WINSTON CHURCHILL turned to painting as a hobby at the age of forty. In it he found relief from the many tensions and nerve-shattering pressures of statesmanship. His paintings, submitted under another name to insure judgment solely on merit, were accepted and exhibited along with leading contemporary artists. The scene reproduced on the preceding page as number 2 is a painting of Sir Winston and Lady Churchill's country home - "Chartwell."



DR. NORMAN VINCENT PEALE, one of America's most famous ministers, has written special Christmas thoughts for Hallmark Cards. These are messages to ponder over, that help recall the deep spiritual meaning of the day. Dr. Peale is the author of several books including the best-seller, "The Power of Positive Thinking." His newspaper column appears in newspapers all over the country.



EDGAR A. GUEST, often called "America's most popular poet," is another writer who contributes to the artistic expression of Christmas. Like his famous books of verse, his Christmas verses for Hallmark Cards are very popular. However, success has left him unaffected.
