### Travel February-July

#### Let's Explore Jefferson City

Wednesday, February 13, 2008

Have you lived in Jefferson City all your life and never taken the time to explore some of our exciting places of interest? Come with us on Wednesday, February 13, 2008, as we tour four of these interesting sites.

We will start this delightful day at the National Guard's "Museum of Missouri Military History" at the Ike Skelton Training Center. Curator Charles Machon is anxious to show us three rooms full of exhibits dating from the Revolutionary War to Iraq and Afghanistan. NOTE: Bring a photo ID (driver's license) in case we need it to enter the Training Center area.

Next we will travel to the new Lewis & Clark State Office Building, commonly known as the DNR "green" building, where their public information officer will take us on a guided tour as we investigate the environmental advantages of this one-of-a kind building in Jefferson City.



Lunch at the G2Gallery on High Street (the Old Lohman Opera House), Jefferson City's newest downtown restaurant, will be both delicious and interesting. After lunch we will walk one block west to the Main U..S. Post Office where we will be given a tour of this federal facility and find out what happens to our mail after we drop it in the mailbox. We then board our bus and travel to the Temple Beth-El, Jefferson City's Jewish Temple, which was built in 1883. Bobbi Herman, a member of the congregation, will give us all the

details as we tour this historic structure.

Level of Difficulty: There are stairs to get to the second floor to eat at The Gallery. The rest of the day should not be strenuous.


## Kansas - From Territorial Conquest to Our 34th President

After a guided tour, through the Kansas History Museum, we board our coach and drive to nearby Wamego. Here we will tour the Dutch Mill site and the Oz Museum. In this small town you will be able to stroll through the park and shops, then choose a restaurant for dining. Our

coach will be waiting to take us to Super 8 for the night.

Thursday, June 5, we depart for Fort Riley where we see "The Commanding Generals Color Guard", followed by a driving tour with a step on guide through the Fort. You will be



#### Amendments to the Constitution

The following proposed amendments to the LIR Constitution will be voted on at the January 18, 2008 Membership Meeting.

AMENDMENT 1 – Rationale & Policy: Frequently, persons who consider joining mid-year do not join because they do not want to pay the full year's dues. The Board is requesting a membership for mid-year in an effort to increase membership.

The words in *italics* are currently in the Constitution and the words in **bold** are the additions. The membership will vote on the following:

Article III- Membership: .... Annual dues will follow the fiscal period from January 1 to December 31. Mid-year dues for new members will be for the period of July 1 to December 31....

The policy to define new member is as follows: A new member who joins after June 30 will pay a membership fee of \$25.00. Mid-year membership applies to a person who has never belonged to LIR or who has not been a member for at least 12 months. The policy is set by the Board and will not be voted on by the members.

\*\*\*\*\*\*

AMENDMENT 2 – Change & Rationale: The Board is requesting the number of Board members be changed from 18 to 13. Eighteen members are considered by many organizations a large number. Also, the number of expired terms per year is not an even amount. Six Board members will have expired terms in 2008. It will be an enormous task to replace this many people. The wording in *italics* is currently in the Constitution. The word in (parenthesis) will be deleted and the word in **bold** will be added. Members will vote on the following:

Article V - Organization and Officers:...The Board of Directors  $(\underline{\imath 8})$  13 members ...

If you have any questions or want to discuss this please talk to a member of the Board.


