

<u>Day Trippin'</u> – visit a Winery, Inn and Museum, local Manufacturing Plant Thursday, May 3, 2012

Enjoy a day in Osage County for a glimpse back in time as we travel to Westphalia, the oldest German Catholic community west of the Mississippi River.

First stop, Westphalia Winery, founded in 2005 by the Neuner family. Terry Neuner will take us on a tour us though the family vineyards, all green and beautiful at this time of year, and we'll visit the remodeled, imposing barn, now the 'Winery', where luscious grapes become Missouri fine wine.

Then it's off to Westphalia Inn, an old Osage County landmark, for wine tasting and a delicious meal served family style. Wine tasting prior to lunch is optional for an additional \$5.00 charge. Following lunch there will be time to browse the Westphalia Historical Museum filled with hundreds of artifacts, furniture and photos dating back to the founding of the city in 1835.

All Around ALTON June 13, 2012

An experience never to forget as we travel to Alton for a day of fun and education!

First stop, National Great Rivers Museum for a movie entitled "Power of the River" and tour of the museum dedicated to telling the story of life on the Mississippi River and how it shaped our culture, history, economy, ecology and people of the region.

Then a tour of the Melvin Price Locks and Dam- from eight stories in the air we see the best view of Alton and the Mississippi. As one of the largest locks on the river it is central to river traffic for commodities transported via the river. Think positive and we will see barges going through.....it worked in Clarksville! (This dam is quite different from Lock and Dam #24 in Clarksville)

After lunch at "My Just Desserts", we tour the Alton Museum of History and Art. Here one of the favorite rooms pays tribute to Robert Wadlow, Alton's "Gentle Giant" and the World's Tallest Man. Learn about the Alton connection to the Lewis and Clark Expedition, Civil War, Lincoln and Douglas debate, Underground Railroad and more.....

A narrated tour of the city with step-on guide completes our day in this historic Mississippi river town in our neighboring state.
