Touring Your Own Hometown

March 16, 2015

March is the perfect time to be a tourist in your hometown! A full day has been planned for you to once again visit more of the hidden treasures in Jefferson City.

First we'll explore the Missouri Military History Museum, which has been expanded to over 6,000 square feet of exhibit space. Collections include artifacts, photographs and documents related to military service in both peace and war time. Displays vary from a chaplains' exhibit to a 1967 Cobra Helicopter. The museum director is anxious to share a wealth of information

Next we tour the Missouri Supreme Court Building. This French Renaissance building was completed in 1907, using a portion of the proceeds from the 1904 World's Fair in St. Louis. The main feature of the building is the massive staircase in the lobby and of interest are permanent displays relating to important cases such as the Dred Scott decision. Would you believe, the library has a glass floor?....can you explain why?

Lunch will be a sampler plate of favorite German dishes at Das Stein Haus. Following lunch we visit the Kirkpatrick State Information Center, which houses state documents dating from 1770. These include court cases, maps, military records and penitentiary records. The Reference Library offers genealogy resources and you will be instructed on how to access information stored here if you are working on your family history. The Wolfner Library for the visually handicapped is also located in this facility.

Our last stop will be the Missouri Highway Patrol Safety and Educational Center. This facility has a comprehensive display of information concerning traffic safety, law enforcement, drug abuse and many items relating to the history of the Missouri Highway Patrol. Exhibits focus on the services and responsibilities of the patrol on and off the highways.

Due to security purposes, you will not be allowed to take purses in the Supreme Court Building: however, they may be left on the bus. Cell phones must be checked at the door. Your coach today will be a 'Yellow School Bus.'

Missouri History and Beautiful Places April 28-29, 2015

Register early for this two-day trip to beautiful and unique Missouri places where, perhaps you have always wanted to go, but haven't managed to get there on your own.

On our first day we travel to Springfield, Missouri, where we visit the world-famous Bass Pro Shop. Its new "Outdoor World" exhibits are scheduled to open by the time of our visit. We'll enjoy a buffet lunch at Hemingway's Restaurant before leaving for the Nathan Boone Home just south of Springfield. Nathan Boone was the youngest child of Daniel and Rebecca Boone and his home, located in Ash Grove, has been restored by the Missouri Division of State Parks. Motoring on to Roaring River State Park we visit another beautiful Missouri spring, view the CCC-constructed spring pool and participate in an optional tour of the trout hatchery. Our overnight stay will be at the Park's Lodge where a buffet dinner will be served, as well as a breakfast buffet in the morning.

Day 2 - Following breakfast we depart for Table Rock Dam to visit the new Dewey Short Visitor Center, view the dam from below and have the opportunity to tour the Department of Conservation's Shepherd of the Hills Fish Hatchery. (Make sure you have quarters for food to feed the fish!)

Lunch will be on your own at "The Only Home of Throwed Rolls" (Lambert's Cafe #2) in Ozark, Missouri.

Traveling only a short distance, we arrive at Rock Ridge Farm, Laura Ingalls Wilder Home and Museum, for a guided tour. Laura Ingalls Wilder spent many hours here writing her childhood experiences of pioneer life which became the favorite "Little House" books that children love today.

Filled with memories and added knowledge of Missouri history and beautiful sites, it's time to journey back to Jefferson City. A comfort and food stop is planned in Camdenton.

Mississippi – The Magnolia State

May 11 - 15, 2015

Located along the mighty Mississippi, Civil War history buffs and foodies alike flock to Vicksburg and Natchez, two of the cities on our itinerary. We hope you'll join us!

Day I – We board our motor coach for our day of travel to Mississippi and stop for lunch at Lambert's in Sikeston, Missouri, famous for their "throwed rolls." Missouri has its "foodie" places too! We continue on to our destination for the first night in Tunica, Mississippi, visiting Tunica River Park with its nature trails and Mississippi River museum. Our hotel for the evening is Sam's Town House and Casino. Your evening is free to partake in one of the great buffet dinners offered at this and other nearby casinos, and you may want to explore one of the gambling venues or rest up for the two busy days ahead.

Day 2 – After a complimentary breakfast at Sam's Town, we board the coach for our first destination, Vicksburg. Following lunch at the Cracker Barrel, we head to the Vicksburg National Military Park, which Mississippi tourism named the "Travel Attraction of the Year." We begin our tour at the Visitor's Center and then have a guide for a two-hour trip through the park which commemorates the campaign, siege, and defense of Vicksburg in

1863. We follow this with a guided tour of the city of Vicksburg itself and then check-in at the Comfort Suites, which will be our home for the next two nights. This evening we have a pork tenderloin dinner in the ballroom of the magnificent 1840's Greek Revival Mansion, Cedar Grove.

Day 3 – After a complimentary buffet at the Comfort Suites, we board our motor coach for the 75 mile trip to Natchez. As stated in the Natchez Official Visitor Guide, "Want a taste of the real South? Then come to Natchez, where you will find a melting pot of cultures with a distinctive attitude toward music, food, and old-fashioned hospitality." We will be taking a guided tour of the city of Natchez as well as touring three plantations (one known for its architecture, one for its period furniture, and a Greek Revival Mansion built by a cotton magnate, where we will also have lunch). We return to Vicksburg utilizing part of the Natchez Trace Parkway, a scenic byway which begins in Natchez. The evening will be free to explore downtown Vicksburg or you may decide to shop at the Outlet Malls close to the Comfort Suites, where we will be spending a second night.

Day 4 – After breakfast at the Comfort Suites, we check out of the hotel and go to downtown Vicksburg. Here we visit the Old Depot or Old Courthouse Museums as well as the Biedenham Coca-Cola Museum. You will have free time to explore, shop and lunch before we begin our journey home in the early afternoon. Our destination for this evening is Jonesboro, Arkansas, where we stay at the Hampton Inn. For dinner that evening we experience local culinary offerings at Ron's Catfish.

Day 5 – After a hot breakfast at Hampton Inn, we continue our travels home via Highway 63. A stop is planned at Mammoth Spring Park, Mammoth Springs, Arkansas. We will stop for lunch near Rolla and plan to arrive in Jefferson City mid-afternoon.

Under the Eight Ball Tipton's Inside Story

June 3, 2015

Discover what's under that 8-ball water tower you see as you

drive along Highway 50 between Jefferson City and Sedalia.

Located in the center of the state, Tipton was founded in 1858 after the Union Pacific Railroad laid out the route, beginning important historical events in the area. The town was a transportation hub from the beginning. The Pacific Railroad ended here for a period of time beginning in 1858 when Tipton became the freight and shipping hub of central Missouri. The first Butterfield Overland Mail stage to San Francisco left Tipton on July 16, 1858. A driving tour will highlight such things as the Tipton Correctional Center, the Price James Library built in 1891, a Civil War cemetery and other points of interest.

Lunch will be served at the Downtown Café.

Following lunch we tour Orvis-Gokey Manufacturing where leather shoes are made by hand. The shoes have a lifetime guarantee and the Tipton plant also repairs all the company's luggage products.

A short drive north will take us to Dick's Mill located at Cotton. The steam-driven mill was built around 1868 and has been restored by two local families to show how wheat and corn were made into meal and flour.

The day will conclude at Zimmerman's Produce and Greenhouses near Latham. Not only do they sell plants, hanging baskets and various produce items, they also grow and sell tomatoes commercially year-round.

Behind the Scenes and More July 9, 2015

Ever wonder what the locker rooms in the Mizzou Arena look like? How about the view from the Press Box at Farout Field? Did you know Mizzou has a new Athletic training complex? If you register for this trip you will find answers to those questions and MORE!

The final tour will be to the State Historical Society of Missouri located on campus, where our own historian, Gary Kremer, serves as Executive Director. At this facility you will find a full art gallery of local history and Missouri fine art from the past, as well as a huge Missouri archive library.

Our final Columbia destination topping off the day will be at Buck's Ice Cream Shop, the official ice cream of the Missouri Tigers.

They may not have been on the actual battlefield, but they did fight. These women were strong and brave and have left their mark on history.

March 11: *Mrs. Miniver* is a 1942 drama starring <u>Greer Garson</u> and <u>Walter Pidgeon</u>. Based on the 1940 novel <u>Mrs. Miniver</u>, the film shows how the life of an unassuming British housewife in rural England is touched by World War II. *Mrs. Miniver* won six <u>Academy Awards</u>. In 2009, the film was named to the <u>National Film Registry</u> for being "culturally, historically or aesthetically" significant and will be preserved for all time.

March 18: *One Against the Wind*: English Countess Mary Lindell, former Red Cross nurse in the First World War, lived in France. The movie shows her support to the Allies especially British and American soldiers in France. This is based on a true story.

March 25: *Swing Shift* is a 1984 film produced by and starring Goldie Hawn with Kurt Russell. During the Second World War, the lead character signs up to work in an armament factory in California while her husband is overseas in naval service.

Top Secret Rosies: The Female 'Computers' of WWII: In 1942, when computers were human and women were underestimated, a group of female mathematicians helped win a war and usher in the modern computer age. A secret US.military program was launched to recruit women to the war effort. Sixty-five years later their story was finally told.

No Job for a Woman: Before World War II, war reporting was considered No Job for a Woman. But when the United States entered the war, American women reporters did not want to miss covering the biggest story of the century so they fought for and won access. They reached beyond the battlefield and deep into human lives to tell a new story of war.
