TRAVEL TIP REMINDERS

Health & Safety

- * COVID precautions will follow LIR guidelines, which at this time include wearing masks at all indoor activities, a temperature check (not over 100 degrees) at outset of trip, use of sanitizer, and social distancing when possible. Coach trips will be limited to 40 people. Should the LIR Board change these guidelines, you'll be notified when we send out the reminder letter.
- * If someone on a trip later tests positive for the virus, you will be contacted as soon as possible.
- * Travelers should carry medication lists with them AT ALL TIMES. Your name badge is a handy storage place. AND, don't forget all your medications.
- * LIR travel requires walking and the physical capability to tour the site. If you have concerns regarding the described activities, please call an escort to discuss the degree of difficulty of the trip's venues.
- * Comfort stops are planned for the comfort and well-being of travelers when travel time is between 2 and 2-1/2 hours. Passengers are encouraged to leave the coach for a short walk for their health.
- * Water is provided for travelers on all trips.
- * Travelers with special dietary needs should contact **an escort PRIOR to the trip** to express their required dietary accommodations.

Registration

- * The two \$5 trips this session are to be paid on day of trip. No payment due with registration.
- * Submit separate checks for each trip (if possible). Couples may combine payments on one check.
- * Checks for multiple trips will be deposited even when placed on a wait list for some trips. Refunds will be made after the date of the trip.
- * When registering with a friend for trips, you are strongly encouraged to mail or drop off registrations together as registrations are recorded as received.
- * Refunds for trip cancellations depend on the ability to fill the vacancy and/or the recovery of expenses already paid.
- * NO deposit is necessary to be placed on a wait list.
- * Registrants for a trip are automatically added to a wait list if the maximum number of travelers has already been confirmed.

General

- * LIR coach trips depart from and return to Walmart Super Center, 724 W. Stadium Blvd. (near the Central Bank ATM). Coaches most often arrive 30 minutes prior to departure time.
- * LIR trips visit both public and government sponsored sites. It is the responsibility of the traveler to follow the guidelines as dictated by the venues visited.
- * Tips are included in the cost of the trip for the coach driver, all included meals, step-on guides, and donations to charitable venues.

HEMP: Missouri's Newest Old Crop

George Washington Carver Research Farm Lincoln University Wednesday, August 4

Spend an afternoon with us at Lincoln University's George Washington Carver (GWC) Research Farm to learn how Lincoln University (LU) has begun studies around hemp growth and cultivation in the last year or so, when the Missouri Department of Agriculture began accepting applications for its Industrial Hemp Program.

We will drive ourselves to the Research Farm at 3804 Bald Hill Road in Jefferson City where we'll be welcomed by the Director of Extension. Then, David Middleton, Outreach Coordinator for the LU Hemp Institute, will share Hemp's history and give us an overview of the Hemp program at Lincoln. After a short restroom break, we'll hop on a hay wagon (or you can drive if you prefer) to where the Hemp plots are. The Director of LU's Hemp Institute will be on hand to fill us in on this intriguing project.

Hemp has been around for a long time but is now seeing a revival in popularity due to a series of legislative actions, both national and state, in the last few years. First planted in Missouri in 1835, industrial hemp spread across the state, becoming the star of farms, ports, factories, and warehouses along the Missouri River. We were second only to Kentucky in hemp production nationwide. At the time, hemp was commonly grown for fiber to make items like rope and bagging for bundled cotton bales. In 1937, Congress passed the Marijuana Tax Act, which regulated cannabis, including hemp, and lessened the crop's economic viability.

We will have plenty of bottled water available and provide a snack. As we'll be outside for part of the time, dress appropriately for the weather (it will be August!) and wear comfy shoes. Directions to the farm will be included in our reminder letter three to four weeks ahead of the event. Hint: It is only a ten-minute drive from East End Gerbes!

Museum of Military History Missouri National Guard's Ike Skelton Training Center Thursday, August 12

If you like history or want to know more about Missouri history in particular, this visit to the Missouri National Guard Military Museum is a must.

Upon arriving at the museum, we will be treated to a guided tour, which tells the story of the Missouri military since its beginning in 1808. This story is told through artifacts such as uniforms, diaries, a Willys Jeep, planes, and much, much more. You'll learn about the soldiers from our state who served in wars and crises beginning with the Revolutionary War and continuing to the Covid-19 issues of today.

We will have one group of 20 for the morning and another group of 20 for the afternoon—you will choose one.

Included with this trip is a visit to a local park pavilion and a delicious catered lunch that the two groups will enjoy together.

Nature's Fall Splendor Prairie Garden Trust Callaway County Wednesday, September 22/Thursday, September 23

This trip is a repeat of the June trip to Prairie Garden Trust (PGT), but this time, we'll see fall colors beginning in the leaves and grasses of the prairie along with flowers such as fall asters providing even more color to the landscape.

Prairie Garden Trust is a gem of a place where you will experience an amazing native grass prairie as well as ponds and wooded areas. Since 1986, over 50 types of native grasses and flowers have been planted to turn a field into a prairie. Part of PGT's mission is to enhance this natural area for the public to experience what it could have been like 200 years ago.

You'll find this lush park area about 17 miles from Jefferson City with two paved trails, each approximately one-half mile in length, and a longer unpaved, but marked, trail with two benches at overlooks along the way to a creek. The paved trails lead to the lotus ponds.

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Missouri's First Learning in Retirement Institute

You will choose your day of exploration and indicate your choice on the Travel Registration Form. After you drive yourself to this beautiful area in Callaway County, you will be joined by a PGT Board member for a guided walk on paved trails to learn about the history of PGT and about the native flowers and plants that grow in abundance. After the guided walk, we will enjoy refreshments and conversation, or you may continue your discovery of the gardens. Bring your own chair for sitting under the shade trees. Directions to the area will be sent with follow-up letters to those registering. Cost includes a donation to PGT as well as water and a packaged snack.

Washington: Small Town Missouri

[This trip was originally planned for July 2020] Tuesday, September 28

The German populace, for which Washington is known, began with the arrival of 12 Catholic families in the fall of 1833. This group and later other German immigrants wrote glowing reviews of the lush, green, rolling hills and the river valley that reminded them of their homeland. The Missouri River offered a natural landing, thus making it an ideal place for a settlement. In May 1839, 50 acres of this area was officially established as the City of Washington.

Our step-on guide, Emily, will tell us about many of Washington's historic structures that still remain today. We will make stops at the Gary Lucy Gallery, the Missouri Meerschaum Corn Cob Pipe Factory Museum, the Iron Spike Model Train Museum, and the Historical Society Museum. In addition, our guide will explain the unique features of St. Francis Borgia Church (However, we will not be able to enter the Church, as the parish is holding Adoration at this time).

Lunch (included in the registration fee) will be at the local Sugarfire Smokehouse, well known for their delicious BBQ, including the trimmings. Time has been allowed for shopping in the historic downtown area—which includes the Main Street Creamery (great ice cream treats)!

The haunted Lemp Mansion in St. Louis

Haunted St. Louis Tour Tuesday, October 5

Get ready for Halloween and be <u>prepared</u> to be <u>scared</u> on this Haunted St. Louis tour. We will leave the Jefferson City Walmart parking lot on Stadium at 7 a.m. with a comfort stop in Warrenton and then head for St. Louis.

Our tour will start when we pick up a step-on guide who will lead us on a driving tour through the Bellefontaine Cemetery. With over 160 years of history, beautiful Bellefontaine Cemetery is both a local landmark and a tranquil final resting place established in 1849. Bellefontaine Cemetery played an important role in the early growth of St. Louis and is the final resting place of many historical figures.

After we depart Bellefontaine Cemetery, we will head for Lemp Mansion where we will have lunch, which includes a house salad, chicken piccata, a vegetable and a potato, rolls and butter, a nonalcoholic drink, and dessert. Lunch is included in your registration fee.

After lunch, we will go on a guided history and ghost tour of the mansion with tales of the supposed haunting facts of the Lemp family and their brewing empire. (Please note, there are two sets of staircases to navigate on this part of the tour.)

Next, we will take a short driving tour of the Lafayette Square historic neighborhood. Once we drop off our step-on guide, we will head to Olive Garden in Wentzville where you can have a salad, snack, or dinner on your own. We will then head home and should arrive back at the Walmart parking lot by 7:30 p.m.

A Leisurely Day In Small Town New Haven Thursday, October 21

Please join us for a leisurely day in a small town. New Haven, with a population of a little over 2,000, has some surprises in store for us. All of the venues we will visit are family-owned and operated or run by local organizations. New Haven is located on the Missouri River and was a steamboat stop in the early days, as well as being the home of John Colter, the "mountain man" of the Lewis and Clark Expedition.

We depart from the Walmart parking lot on Stadium Boulevard at 8:00 a.m., arriving at the New Haven Preservation Museum at approximately 9:30 a.m. The museum is located in the Old New Haven School, which was built in 1883 and remained in operation for more than 100 years. We will split into two groups and take turns visiting the museum and viewing a film about New Haven's history.

Following our museum visit, we will board the coach for a tour of the Assumption Catholic Church to hear its history and view its beautiful stained-glass windows. After the tour, we will board the coach for lunch at T and T Café. Lunch is included in your registration fee.

On the coach again, we will head to Seek Coffee Company, a family-owned coffee shop and roastery. We will do a coffee tasting and learn about the various coffee origins and roasts.

Once again, we will board the coach for a five-minute ride to downtown New Haven. The venues are small, so we will split into three rotating groups to visit the following venues:

- * The John Colter Museum is a small museum featuring Colter's experiences with the Lewis and Clark Expedition, Native American Artifacts, and Missouri River History.
- * The Astral Glass Company artisans will demonstrate the glassblowing process. They specialize in hand-blown art glass and have a lovely shop displaying many of their items.
- * Several shops on Front Street will be open for your shopping pleasure, or you can walk on the levee and watch the river go by. Some benches are available as is a small, covered pavilion with picnic tables if you prefer to take a break.

Finally, we board the coach for Robler Winery where we will learn about the grapes grown onsite and taste some of their delicious wine while enjoying the beautiful view of the rolling hills and the vineyard. At 4:30 p.m., we will board the coach for the ride home, arriving at the Walmart parking lot at approximately 6:00 p.m.

Note: Several venues are not ADA compliant but have locations to relax while waiting to rejoin the group.

Missouri Rhineland Stained Glass

Hermann and Vicinity Tuesday, November 9

Missouri abounds with churches that beautifully display the word of God and the teachings of Christ through the art of stained glass. Join us as we tour regional churches with Ken Luebbering and Robyn Burnett, co-authors of *Gospels in Glass: Stained Glass Windows in Missouri Churches*. In addition to having the benefit of their stained glass expertise, trip participants will receive a copy of their book.

Our coach will depart at 8:45 a.m. arriving at our first destination, Church of the Risen Savior in Rhineland, at 9:45 a.m. The coach will be located near the Central Bank ATM on the north side of the Walmart parking lot at 724 Stadium Blvd.

Traveling by coach will allow trip participants to relax and enjoy some of the beautiful scenery in Missouri's Rhineland area as we head toward each destination. We will be visiting four churches in the Missouri River Valley west of St. Louis heavily settled by immigrants from German-speaking regions in Europe during the 19th century. The three Catholic churches we will visit: Church of the Risen Savior, Rhineland; St. George, Hermann; and the Shrine of Our Lady of Sorrows, Starkenburg, all have windows created by the Emil Frei Studios in St. Louis in the first quarter of the 20th century. The Frei Studio has been the preeminent stained glass company in Missouri since the late 1800s. The windows in these churches were designed in what is called the Munich style. The windows in St. Paul's United Church of Christ, Hermann, are also from the same time period but are not Frei windows; they provide an interesting contrast of styles. The four churches contain a diverse range of subjects depicted in glass that will allow us to consider both this beautiful artistic medium as well as the religious functions and the ethnic influences seen in these windows.

While in Hermann, we will lunch (included in your registration fee) at the Tin Mill Restaurant and Brewery, established in 2004. Diners will have the opportunity to enjoy the quaint charm and architecture of the restaurant while feasting from a variety of delicious menu items. After being confirmed on the trip, you will make a selection from the options offered. Since a generous amount of time has been allotted for lunch, some diners may decide to take the opportunity after eating to tour the brewery or browse in some of the nearby shops found along Hermann's picturesque streets.
